Our creative curriculum



A focus this academic year has been on writing and increasing the attainment levels across the school, through a variety of writing opportunities for all children. Results across the school have been very good this year.





What we are improving

Each year the school sets priorities as part of our School Improvement Plan. The Governing Board reviews these priorities regularly. During 2018/19 the key aims were:

- Continually strive for excellence
- Give children solid foundations in academic (secular and Kodesh), practical and life skills to become confident learners and leaders.
- Promote an open-minded, tolerant, respectful environment with a clear understanding of British values and the wider world around us.
- Foster a love of Torah learning and Israel
- Ensure that Every Child Matters and provides equal opportunities for across all areas of school life





Every child matters

At North West Every Child Matters and progress has always been closely monitored so that support, if needed, can be put in place quickly.

Each year group is expected to achieve and progress in different subjects. Teachers must predict in the autumn term the expectations that each child is likely to achieve by the end of the school year. Each child's progress is then reviewed throughout the year in terms of whether or not they, as individuals are achieving to the best of their own ability and inline with predictions.





Assessments

- Along with a lot of schools in Brent, we use a software and support programme called Target Tracker to help teachers monitor progress in Reading, Writing, Maths and Science.
- To add to these teacher assessments, we use standardised tests which allow staff to know how the performance of our pupils compare with other children of a similar age across the UK.
- Children's attainment in reading, writing, maths and science are categorised as "working towards", "working at" or "working above" the expected range for their age group, nationally.
- In order to provide quality teaching for every child, senior teachers and advisors scrutinise teachers' lesson plans, look at children's books and observe teachers in action. This ensures that standards remain high and that all children are taking part. There is a robust programme of training.
- The Headteacher and Assessment Co-ordinator meet with the class teachers each half term at a pupil progress meeting, where progress of each child is looked at and where needed, interventions are put in place.
- Some children also receive additional support, sometimes in small groups and sometimes individually. Interventions vary according to their age, needs and progress.



Assessments

- Children with special educational needs have Individual Educational Plans (IEPs) that are regularly reviewed with their parents. They also have Pupil Passports drawn up by the Every Child Matters co-ordinator, learning support assistants, the children themselves and their parents. These describe what they can do, what they find difficult and what support works for them.
- Regular meetings are organised with parents of children with Education, Health and Care Plans so that they could feed back on how things are going. They also look at the progress made and how effective the interventions in place are.
- Nationally, the progress of children receiving free school meals is not as good as those who do not. Schools receive additional money known as the Pupil Premium, which is used to provide further support. The progress of these children, their levels of attainment and the use of this funding are all carefully monitored by senior management and governors.





Kodesh

- The foundation of Kodesh in our School is reading and, whilst the basic skills are mastered in Reception and Year 1, there is a weekly Hebrew reading lesson in Years 2 to 4 to consolidate the children's reading skills. In Year 5 & 6, there are 1-1 interventions in place. Pupils receive weekly Hebrew reading homework which helps them reinforce and maintain their reading skills. Our aim is for every child at North West to be an accurate, confident and fluent reader.
- Another important part of our Kodesh curriculum is Chumash and we aim for our children to be able to skilfully analyse any given Hebrew text. This year, we continued with a weekly targeted Chumash Skills lesson (in KS2). These lessons are skills focused and have helped to even further advance the children's textual abilities. Years 5 and 6 are also assessed on their skills in the commentary of Rashi on Chumash in the three areas of reading, translating and comprehension. By the time they are in Year 6 pupils are able to decipher 80%-90% of unseen Chumash texts using their vocabulary and grammar skills'. And that 'Pupils enjoy their Torah learning. This was evident during observations of lessons and in discussion with pupils'.
- We have also put great efforts into our teaching of Ivrit. We aim for each child to reach a sound level of conversational Ivrit. To reinforce, enhance and raise the profile of Ivrit in our school, our Ivrit teachers have worked with the children on various drama performances in Ivrit which were performed at different assemblies over the course of the year. This year, we have also continued with our successful Ivrit Ulpan for Year 6 to enhance the children's Ivrit before they move on to their high schools. To further enhance and develop Ivrit within our school we have a Shin Shin for at least 2 days a week. The Shin Shin helps further enrich the children's Ivirt and knowledge of Israel, as well as, work with the Ivrit speaking children.



Financial year-end review

The finance committee's key activities this year were:

- Review and submission to the ESFA of the audited accounts for the y/e 31 August 2018
- Review and oversight of the school's monthly management accounts
- Review and submission of 3 year school budget to the ESFA
- Provide ongoing support to the other school committees for all financial related matters





Cost pressure

Financial outlook for the next academic year

The school remains resilient under ongoing cost pressure. However, our financial position remains precarious and uncertain due to another squeeze on income from our main source of funding. The school's government funding has not materially increased for 4 years, whereas the school's cost base has increased due to pension auto-enrolment, mandatory increases to pension contributions, inflation and SEN costs.

Grateful for parents annual voluntary contributions

We are incredibly grateful to the parent body for continuing to support the school through their annual voluntary contributions. Without this additional funding, the school would run a deficit and we would not be able to continue offering the current high standard of teaching and education experience for our children. We hope that we can continue to rely on your support for the upcoming academic year and beyond.






How the school spends its annual budget





Where our Funds come from





Kodesh funding

North West's excellent kodesh, Jewish Studies and our cultural and welfare curriculum, is **NOT** funded via the Department for Education. We rely on the parents of North West to pay a contribution to fund this superb education. Unless the payments are made by parents, the funds required to run the Kodesh Department, to pay our teachers' salaries and to provide its resources will not be there.

Thank you to all parents who contribute to this essential fund

As parents, we have chosen to send our children to NWLJDS on account of its religious ethos and its provision of Jewish education. It is therefore vital that all parents appreciate their responsibilities for payment of these contributions. Sadly, a single parent's failure to contribute can affect the whole school, since there will not be enough money to cover all the costs. The impact on the ethos of the school cannot be over emphasised.



Kodesh Scholarship Fund

The Trustees appreciate that the cost of these contributions can be a financial challenge for some families and The Trustees have set up a Scholarship Fund which is available to assist cases of financial hardship. The Scholarship Fund can **ONLY** assist with the payment of contributions where parents have requested assistance.

Kodesh financial outlook

The Trustees work with the Finance Committee and Governing Body to help mitigate the financial challenges faced by the school, by exploring additional funding and cost reduction initiatives. We are proactive in constantly seeking alternative funding sources and work closely alongside other Jewish Schools who face similar challenges. Our priority is the maintenance of the highest standard of Kodesh Studies we are currently offering our pupils.


